

# Oldest and youngest chase solo records

The race is on, as it were, to set new records for the youngest and the oldest to sail single-handed round the world.

The indomitable Japanese sailor Minoru Saito, 74, left Yokohama in October on his eighth and possibly most testing solo voyage round the world: to sail non-stop round the world westabout.

Saito, one of the most experienced ocean sailors in the world, has accumulated more than 240,000 miles and finished his last solo circumnavigation three years ago despite a heart condition.

Meanwhile, 16-year-old Zac Sunderland is more than halfway through his round the world voyage. The Californian arrived in the Cocos Keeling Islands in the Indian Ocean in October and is repairing a broken boom. He aims to become the youngest circumnavigator.




Hot on his heels will be Michael Perham, also 16. Perham made his name as the youngest to sail across the Atlantic last year in a 28ft trailer sailer, *Cheeky Monkey*. His family have chartered an Open 50 and the plan is for him to leave in early November to sail non-stop round the world, becoming the youngest person to do so single-handed.

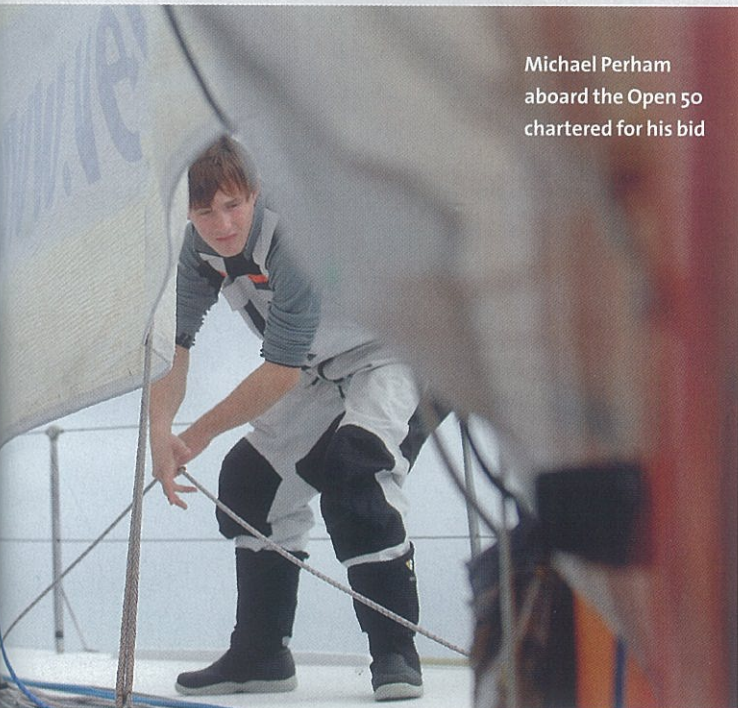

**Yachtsman killed by pirates**

Venezuela's reputation as a no-go area for cruisers worsened in September when French charter skipper Philippe Leudière was shot and killed aboard his Lagoon 410 catamaran Chrysalide at anchor in the port of Caraballeda. Leudière was confronted by a number of armed robbers and shot four times.

The gang plundered the boat and escaped with Venezuelan bolivars and US dollars.

Incidents are becoming disturbingly regular. The French Ministry of Foreign Affairs has confirmed that this is the fourth act of piracy this year against French nationals cruising in Venezuela and has advised against visiting the mainland or the island of Margarita.
